

Tasks

- 1) The first 8 minutes discusses how Elizabeth was perceived in the final years of her reign, and the legacy that is carried into Stuart Britain. Create a mind map or notes on these perceptions.
- 2) The Monarch who took the English throne following Elizabeth was James, this is where the A level course begins. Why would the fact he was male and had male heirs be popular? What challenges may there be with James being also the Scottish King?
- 3) Why do you think this lecturer makes the point that Elizabeth's 'ghost' was always looking over James? What does this suggest about public feeling of the dead Queen?
- 4) What themes from Elizabeth's reign do you think will become a challenge for James?
- 5) Why do you think this constant reminder of Elizabeth would make James' early years difficult for him?
- 6) Why do you think James placed Reynolds (Created pro Elizabeth pamphlets during James' reign) in prison?

EXTENSION: Do you believe the ghost of Elizabeth would shape the personality of King James? Explain.

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Absolutism

A form of government in which the head of state is the absolute ruler of the country

Calvinism

Protestant sect founded by John Calvin. Emphasized a strong moral code and believed in predestination (the idea that God decided whether or not a person would be saved as soon as they were born).

Caroline

An era of English and Scottish history which coincided with the reign of Charles I (Carolus being Latin for Charles)

Crown Patronage

The power of the monarch to bestow jobs or titles in order to gain the loyalty of the recipient

Dissenters

Protestants who differed with the Church of England

Episcopacy

The Bishop's governance of his church

Great Chain of Being

The idea that everyone has a place in society, and the if the top is affected, so is the bottom
